Make safety your goal!

As a soccer player, parent, coach, team manager, club official, referee or spectator you can play a part in ensuring equipment used for your soccer game is safe and suitable.

The best goalposts to use are those that are permanently fixed into the ground. When these are not available, moveable goalposts can be used as an alternative. If you use moveable goalposts you must strictly adhere to safety rules, as falling goalposts can be dangerous.

What is a moveable soccer goalpost?

Moveable soccer goalposts can be described as any freestanding soccer goalpost designed to be moved from field to field, or to be moved on and off a field.

Moveable goalposts that are used indoors are exempt from new safety standards as they are likely to be less than 28kg in weight.



Why are moveable soccer goalposts unsafe?

Moveable soccer goalposts can cause serious injury and death if they are:

- improperly designed or manufactured;
- incorrectly installed;
- unanchored or not adequately anchored; or
- unstable.

Falling soccer goalposts have caused deaths and resulted in serious injuries!

Preventing injuries and deaths

NEW moveable soccer goalposts must comply with a WA law introduced on 9 June 2006 requiring manufacturers to produce to higher safety standards.

However, it is unlikely that EXISTING soccer goalposts will comply with the new standards.

Unanchored or inadequately anchored goalposts can tip over causing serious injury or death.

For the safety of children it is important that all moveable soccer goalposts are correctly secured or stored safely away at all times.

Following are four steps to anchoring goalposts that should be undertaken before EVERY match and training session. Measures taken will depend on soil conditions.

✓ **Check it**

- Ensure all goalposts are in good condition and constructed according to Standards Australia. Go to www.standards.org.au to purchase your copy of the Standards Australia Handbook HB227-2003. Type "soccer goalposts" in the search box entitled "Find an Australian Standard" to locate the handbook and place your order.

✓ **Secure it**

- Generally it takes 200kg to anchor a moveable soccer goalpost, with weights distributed evenly on the ground bar and both side supports. This equates to:
 - using 10 hooked pegs; or
 - 12 sandbags; or
 - 10 bags of cement mix.

Moveable goalposts can also be secured by inserting the frame into ground sleeves. This is the preferred approach. Moveable goalposts placed in ground sleeves are commonly known as semi-permanent goalposts.

- It is imperative that further details on anchoring are obtained from Standards Australia or by contacting the Department of Consumer and Employment Protection.

✓ **Test it**

- Before use, adults (preferably club officials) should test all moveable soccer goalposts to make sure they are stable.
- If you are unsure about the safety of your goalposts, do not use them until they have been tested professionally. Search for local goalpost testers to undertake professional stability tests by visiting www.footballwest.com.au, click on 'Club Admin', then click on 'Goalpost Testing'.

✓ **Respect it**

- Never allow anyone to climb or swing on the netting or goalpost framework.
- Goalposts should never be left unattended on the ground. They should either be stored away or chained together on the grounds.
